## Contributions welcome

### JPH particularly welcomes submissions of articles in two new categories:

**Perspectives** – presents critical views on controversies in public health practice, policy and politics in an analytic essay format. The lead article should be no longer than 3000 words plus 5 figures/tables/illustrations, and is usually accompanied by 2 or 3 commentaries, each at about 800 words plus at most 1 table/figure/illustration. Articles and commentaries in this section are usually commissioned, but the Editors welcome authors' ideas and proposals.

**Chekhov's corner** – focuses on the intersection of the arts and humanities with public health practice. Wide-ranging contributions are considered; for example this might be from the perspective of a public health professional reflecting on a particular piece of art, drama or literature that has prompted them to see a public health issue in a new light, or has new relevance for today; or perhaps a perspective on a public health problem from an arts and humanities view point, helping us to consider an issue or problem in a new light as a public health community. Articles should be no longer than 1500 words. Editors welcome author's idea and proposals.
